For the digital component, you have three choices:

- o Build a website (Weebly education) see Mrs. Krygsheld for web address access.
- o Create a Google Slides Presentation create this on your LCS Google Drive.
- Create a Power Point presentation (or similar from other software, including Prezi) share via email or send a link.

Remember, whichever you choose, the <u>digital presentation</u> portion of your project should include the basic information about *both* the historical context *and* about the event itself. Do NOT just copy and paste your paper into the new format. Rather, include highlights and give them visual appeal. You should include graphic elements including things like photographs, illustrations (correctly cited, of course, unless the illustrations are your own individual designs). To include your original artwork, either take a photograph of it or scan it (if you don't have access to a scanner or scanning app, see Mrs. Krygsheld, who will scan it for you). If you wish to include links to video clips from You Tube, Vimeo or some other sources, be sure to limit them, either by editing them (via Safeshare.tv or Safeyoutube.net or similar) or by stating how many seconds of the video we should view.

The <u>oral report</u> is an in-class presentation of your digital project. Do NOT plan to read your report, but rather present the highlights of it in an engaging manner, using your digital presentation as the foundation. You will make this presentation to the Civics class.

You will submit the digital project to Mrs. Krygsheld – either by sharing your website URL or by "sharing" it with her on your Google Drive or by emailing a copy of the presentation or a link to its location. Your oral presentation should last between 4 and 9 minutes or so, perhaps slightly longer if it includes video clips, though they should be short snippets, not lengthy videos. You may use up to three 3x5 cards to reference notes, if needed. As with the written portions of your project, this portion will also receive a quiz grade for grammar class (based on mechanics) and for History/Civics class (based on presentation).
